The Nurture Hub at Edna G. Olds Academy

At Edna G. Olds Academy, we believe all children should achieve their full potential through an inclusive and supportive approach. Our Nurture Hub provides further opportunities for pupils to develop positive, secure relationships with teachers and peers in a supportive environment.

The Nurture Hub aims to support our children to develop their self-esteem, confidence, and social skills. Within the group, there is a special emphasis on developing genuine and supportive relationships and pupils are given the time they need both to listen and be listened to. This work enhances relationships within their classroom and supports children to be in a ready to learn state.

Children are given opportunities to talk through and reflect upon any uncomfortable feelings. Children are given support to find ways to verbalise challenges they may face on a day-to-day basis and offered strategies to manage and cope with these.

We have had a great start to the year. The nurture hub has been open during several lunches and will now be open daily for KS2!

The nurture breakfast has been a great success and the invited children have enjoyed having a calm and nurturing start to the day.





Year 4

During this half term, Year 4 visited Wollaton Hall to support their learning linked to the Romans. The children learnt what life was like for a Roman person, such as what they would eat, life for the rich and poor and daily items used for grooming. They took part in some drama to immerse themselves into the Roman experience. The children learnt that life for the rich was much easier, as the poor slaves would have to do most of the work. Year 4 enjoyed their trip and gained a greater understanding of Roman life and how different it was compared to the modern day.
