Welcome back!



Topic

Our topic this half term is Winter. We will be focussing on the text Where Snowflakes Fall by Claire Freedman and Tina Mcnaughton.

We have lots of winter activities planned including learning about winter animals and their habitats, doing icy science experiments and creating some wintery art work. Keep an eye out on Showbie for these activities.

Phonics and Reading

In phonics this half term we are focussing on our phase 3 digraphs (two letters which make one sound). Each week we learn 2 or 3 new sounds. Keep practising and revisiting these sounds everyday to support your child with their reading.

It is also important to get into a good routine with reading books. Remember you can login to Oxford Owls every day and read differentiated texts suited to individual abilities. If you would like to know which book band colour your child reads, please ask one of the reception teachers.

Maths

In maths this half term, we are focussing on shape, space and measure followed by addition and subtraction.

At this stage in learning, we use lots of concrete objects and pictures to help secure understanding and develop thinking skills.

Remember to login to Math Seeds or NumBots every day to practise your number skills.
